Often times, I receive vital information regarding homeownership within the State of Maryland. Currently, there is a Homestead Tax Credit, which is a tax credit that protects homeowners, regardless of age, income or property value, from annually spiking tax bills on the home you currently own. Applications must be postmarked or received by December 31, 2012 or the homeowners will lose this credit for the tax year beginning on July 1, 2013. You may request your application by calling 1.410.767.2165 or emailing, heredit@dat.state.md.us. If you believe that you have already applied check the Real Property Database, pull up your property, and then scroll to the "Homestead Application Information," section at the bottom of the page to check your application status.

A new component of the HOA, which we are about to embark into is the implementation of its' first business plan. Over the last three months I have created a business plan that would capture my vision and produce a structured guide to identify the needs of the community, as well as, defining areas of importance for the association to focus on. HALLOWEEN COSTUME TIPS

You should only purchase costumes that are made of flame retardant material. If they are home made, make sure you use fabrics that are inherently flame resistant, such as nylon and polyester. The federal Flammable Fabrics Act (FFA) requires costumes sold at retail to be flame-resistant. To prevent costume-related burns, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) enforces this requirement and recalls costumes and other products that violate the FFA act.

Buy your costumes from a reputable online or brick-and-mortar store that sells high quality products and has efficient customer service such as Halloween Express.

Try to work reflector strips into your child's costume, a flash light or light stick to make them more visible at night. This will make them more visible by drivers and you can keep an eye on them as well if they get ahead of you while out trick or treating.

Make sure that your costume fits properly to avoid any accidents like tripping over a long dress or cape. Make sure that it is comfortable since it will probably be worn for several hours. Do not include high heel shoes or long dangling pieces of costume that could be tripped over. A scraped knee or bloody nose can really ruin the fun.

If they are carrying a prop such as a scythe or sword, make sure they are made out of a flexible plastic that will bend if fallen on. Most of the props available today are made of flexible plastic.

Be sure to pre-test any makeup you plan to use by applying a small amount on the arm of the person who will be wearing it for about thirty minutes a couple of days in advance. If a rash, redness, swelling, or any other signs of irritation develop where the makeup was applied, it could be a sign of a possible allergy or adverse reaction.

If a mask is worn, make sure that the eye holes are big enough to see not only in front but peripherally as well. You may have to cut them open further yourself. If so, use some black or gray grease paint around the eye socket to cover skin.

FURNACE SAFETY

With the change of the season upon us, now is a good time to take a proactive approach to furnace safety and maintenance.

Replacing filters (change filters with the seasons)

Filters should be replaced three or four times a year. Filters help your furnace run more efficiently, saves money and keeps dust from being circulated through your home. Additionally, it is highly recommended that your furnace is checked and cleaned every year. The older the furnace the more important service is. Newer gas furnaces have devices that will shut the system down if there is a problem.



Below are some safety tips to follow:

- Keep the area around the furnace clean and unobstructed
- Keep the burner area of your furnace clean
- Furnaces that require lubrication should be attended by a qualified technician yearly
- No combustibles within six inches of your vent pipe
- Do not close off more than 20% of the registers in your home
- Consider installing fresh air combustion
- Use a carbon monoxide detector
- Provide adequate ventilation to the unit.

Some signs of a sick furnace:

- Flakes of rust produced by the by-products of burning gas (could delay gas flow)
- Grinding, chattering sounds from relay (could be electrical problem)
- Yellow Flame (indicates dirt), the flame should be red and blue
- Dusty smell (you can smell when you turn up your thermostat within minutes)

And last but not least; always be mindful of Carbon Monoxide Poisoning. It is colorless, odorless, and tasteless and a small amount can kill you if concentrated enough. Symptoms include headaches, dizziness, faintness, pain in ears, and seeing spots. Many people confuse this with the flu







NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH



It is unfortunate to say, but we have had a recurring problem with some of the youth in our community. Over the last few months, the HOA has received numerous complaints regarding children leaving trash strewn about the neighborhood, roaming our streets late in the evening and there have been incidents of vandalism.

The Town of Hampstead has a curfew of 10 PM for minors. Any minor that is roaming the streets of our neighborhood without an adult after 10 PM may receive a citation from the Hampstead Police Department. *The parents of that child will also be cited and can be fined up to \$500*.

On the evening of October 5th, at least 6 cars were vandalized with vulgarities and anti-Semitic symbols being written on them in window chalk. Check your house to see if you have (or are missing) white, black and blue window chalk. Please talk to your children about the severity of these crimes and know that they are not "harmless pranks". This type of behavior will not be tolerated and there have been police reports filed by your neighbors. People who are caught vandalizing our neighborhood will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

Several children who regularly play baseball in the field behind the townhouses have been seen on multiple occasions leaving their trash behind and even worse, throwing their empty drink bottles over the fence. There is quite a bit of trash on the other side of the fence near the railroad tracks that has been left by our neighborhood children. Additionally, the HOA has received complaints about these same children using vulgar language within earshot of younger children on the playground. We are confident that this is not language that their parents would appreciate hearing in their own homes. If your children frequently play on that field, please have a talk with them about responsibly disposing of their trash as well as appropriate language to use in public.



Along the same lines, since school has started there have been complaints children littering their drink containers and food bags in the street along Upper Forde Lane, Farmwoods Lane and the unnamed street leading to the pavilion. Roaming groups of kids have also been spotted throwing newspapers and other trash in the evenings.

Due to these occurrences, the HOA would like to start a neighborhood watch program. "If you see something, say something!" These issues are not something that the HOA has jurisdiction over, however we have a very close relationship with the Hampstead Police Department. If you observe someone breaking the law, please report it to the Hampstead Police (410-239-8954). PFC Clint Thorn is assigned to North Carroll Farms and Officer Clint frequently attends our monthly HOA meetings. If you have not met him, come to one of our meetings and say 'hello'.


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Friendly Reminder:
